



A MESSAGE FROM OUR **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

This is the most exciting letter I have ever written in the six years I have been the executive director of Curamericas Global. I have been named one of the <u>Triangle Business Journal</u> 2020 Health Care Heroes!

I am incredibly humbled and grateful for this recognition, but most importantly for where we are as an organization today. We've learned, grown, and accomplished many milestones over the last few years. We've been able to establish our presence in conflicting, vulnerable, forgotten areas here and around the world and saved thousands of women and children. But this is not my success alone. We've done this, in great part, because of your unwavering support.

Ignited by the critical unmet needs of vulnerable populations, led through our unique CBIO research methodology, measured by key outcomes, and championed by local communities is how I would describe the journey we began in 2016 when we kicked-off our five-year strategic plan.

Since then, the plan has been lived out by everyone at Curamericas Global. From the staff to the fully committed 23 board members, our stakeholders, donors and in-country partners, this plan has become our compass, our north and guiding force to reaching and serving 1.6 million people and bringing hope and transformation in the U.S. and abroad.

Despite the challenges, our pursuit of sustainable, community-driven, and effective public health programs has paid off. Together, with staff, donors, supporters, in-country partners, and Care Groups, we have been able to:

- Empowered more than **2,200 public health professionals** to focus on community health and well-being through train-the-trainer, best practices sharing, and educational efforts such as the Third Annual Curamericas Partners Symposium on January 28, 2019.
- Delivered state-of-the-art technical services to **five local partners** and other local agencies in **four countries**, including the U.S., Guatemala, Bolivia, and Kenya, benefiting the many communities we serve.

- Strengthened relationships with existing partners in Bolivia, Guatemala, Haiti, Kenya, and Liberia, and established new partnerships in North Carolina and Pennsylvania.
- Achieved financial sustainability through a stable, diverse, and growing fundraising base, including the Hope through Health Endowment, valued at more than \$3,000,000.
- Strengthen the Curamericas Global brand by spreading the word and positioning the organization as an expert voice in the public health sector, reaching more than **3.4 million people** and gaining exposure and credibility through reputable sources such as the *Triangle Business Journal*, the Platinum GuideStar Nonprofit Profile Seal of Transparency, the Center for High Impact Philanthropy at the University of Pennsylvania, the Pan-American Health Organization (PAHO) Community Health Experts Conference in Washington, DC., *The Journal of Nutrition*, and the Saving Lives at Birth Grand Challenge by Bill Gates, among others.

As we approach the final stretch of the five-year strategic plan, our focus remains clear and our purpose is stronger than ever. Our hearts continue to break when we see women and children, families, and communities experiencing obstacles to maintaining their health and wellbeing.

We know that these obstacles stem from social conditions as well as a history of political, social, and financial marginalization. But this taxing reality has not and won't stop us now. This is the reason we exist – to make a difference, to bring hope, healing, and positive change through health.

With other organizations, like UNICEF and USAID, we are committed and working tirelessly to end preventable child and maternal deaths by 2035.

So, would you join us?

PARTNERS IN ACTION

We partner with community-focused public health professionals and passionate local healthcare leaders in underserved communities around the world.

Working with our partners, we can implement effective and efficient interventions based on local health needs and priorities. From the ground up, we are also able to measure the results to guide adjustments and enhancements to our programs.

Engagement with local communities and developing mother-centered services are a crucial part of our culture and approach to sustainable change. But we couldn't do it without our in-country partners. This year, we are highlighting three of them:

Kenyan Ministry of Health

Since October 2017, Curamericas Global has partnered with the Ministry of Health and Ronald McDonald House Charities (RMHC) to reduce the number of moms and babies dying from preventable causes in Kisii County, Kenya. Since our project began, we have reduced maternal death by over 70 percent, saving lives of mothers across 53 partner communities, trained 285 community leaders, health volunteers, medical professionals, and government officials. In 2019 alone, we served over 23,000 people, and plan to reach 43,000 in 2020.

Andean Rural Health Care, or Consejo de Salud Rural Andino (CSRA)

Through 25 years of partnership in Bolivia, we have successfully addressed the causes of maternal and childhood illness and mortality through interventions including immunizations, diarrhea, and pneumonia case management, nutrition, maternal and newborn care, and family planning. Today, CSRA has benefited more than 140,000 people.



Government of Guatemala in North Carolina

Since 2017, we have partnered with the Guatemalan Consulate in Raleigh, NC. Our goal is to help reduce the inappropriate use of the emergency department and to increase preventative care by educating Guatemalan immigrants in the Carolinas about the benefits of primary health care providers and empowering them to take control of their health. In 2019, we provided one-on-one consultations to over 230 people who otherwise have no access to basic healthcare.

By working with the consulate, Curamericas Global hopes to establish a closer connection to the Carolinas' Guatemalan community and obtain data on their health care needs. The goal is to help every Guatemalan immigrant be established with a provider, allowing continuity of care, and reducing the costly use of emergency rooms and walk-in clinics, while improving ongoing management of their chronic problems, such as hypertension and diabetes.


She enjoys working with women and children and finds it rewarding to know that her work has reduced maternal and child deaths.



Our Volunteers and Interns Give Hope and Save Lives

Thank you for helping us fulfill our mission by saving us an estimated \$125,000 in operational costs every year. Because of our volunteers and interns, we can allocate more funding directly to programs and services.

In 2019, we had 101 office volunteers and interns that helped fulfill our mission by donating a total of 5,363 hours at our office in Raleigh, NC. We also had 66 volunteers from around the world donating 6,879 hours valued at \$166,403. They are some of our most dedicated supporters and we cannot thank them enough for their commitment.
